

KC Arts Centre




CHARMING TIONG BAHRU

Built in the 1930s, Tiong Bahru is one of Singapore's oldest housing estates and one of the hippest too. Home to distinctive architecture, quaint shops and cool eateries, its easy, eclectic vibe is well-loved by all.



Art Deco Architecture

Stroll along Tiong Poh Road and spot the Streamline Moderne blocks, featuring curves reminiscent of cars and planes from the 30s. On Lim Liak Street, see how the International Style flats there have been adapted to the tropics with five-foot ways and airwells.



Cheng's @ 27

This family-run Hainanese eatery serves up soul food lovingly perfected over three generations. The pig trotter bee hoon is worth every calorie and so is the gula melaka chiffon cake. Don't forget to take home a jar of their kaya, made fresh daily.



Tiong Bahru Market

On the lower floor is a wet market selling fresh produce, meats and all the ingredients you need to cook up a storm. Or head upstairs to fill your tummy right away at the hawker centre. Let the long queues lead you to the most popular stalls, but the chwee kueh is a must.


Tiong Bahru Bakery

What started as a humble bakery in Tiong Bahru has now become a familiar name with its 7 outlets islandwide. If you're spoilt for choice among the selection of handmade viennoiseries, go for the kouign amann — buttery, flaky and impossibly delicious.



Murals of Old Singapore

From roadside hawkers and fortune tellers to bird singing clubs and inside the home, glimpse a bygone era through these lovely paintings found all over the estate. Take your time to drink in the details for you'll be richly rewarded.



Nana & Bird

Up your style quotient with chic picks ranging from women's fashion and accessories, to home décor and an adorable kids' collection. Besides their own label, they also carry a tightly curated selection from other like-minded brands.



CHINATOWN HERITAGE ENCLAVE

Raffles himself planned for this enclave to accommodate the many Chinese immigrants who flocked to this new land to make their fortune. Maintaining its identity even today, steep yourself in Chinese culture as you explore the historical streets.



牛车水 Ox Cart Water

Otherwise known as Kreta Ayer, this area is the heart of Chinatown. Where ox carts once carried water, the streets are now filled with those who come to admire the conserved shophouses occupied by the traditional (clans, medical halls) as well as the modern (cafes, clubs).



Chinatown Complex Food Centre

Gone are the days when hawkers peddled their food by the roadside, but their legacy lives on here. Savour a trove of traditional dishes from over 200 stalls like claypot rice, steamed fish head and the ever-popular soya sauce chicken.



Singapore Musical Box Museum

Located beside the historic Thian Hock Keng, you can kill two birds with one stone here. Admire the fascinating collection of antique musical boxes before heading next door to the temple which has received an honourable mention in the UNESCO Heritage Awards.



Chinatown Street Art

Have fun hunting down the many murals dotting the area. Discover scenes from the past such as Chinese opera, lion dance costume makers, samsui women and more. Inexplicably, there's also one of Bruce Lee holding a durian...



Tong Heng

Tong Heng has captured the hearts and bellies of locals for close to a century with their signature egg tarts. With their flaky crust and luscious wobbly custard, there's no stopping at one! Savour other traditional Cantonese classics such as 'Wife' pastry, walnut cookie and more.



Tea Appreciation at Tea Chapter

Take a break from all that walking and sign yourself up for a lesson in tranquillity. Beyond tastings, delve into the world of tea with a choice of sessions that offer a deep dive or a leisurely introduction to Chinese tea culture.

Singapore**


Dating back to 1887, the museum is the nation's oldest and an architectural icon too. Far from a staid affair, go on an immersive journey as you discover fresh perspectives of the Singapore story. Their Night Festival is a magical experience and a highlight on the arts calendar.



National Gallery Singapore

Explore the world's largest public collection of Singapore and Southeast Asian modern art. As if that's not reason enough to spend a day here, the gallery is housed within City Hall and the former Supreme Court, two beautifully restored national monuments.
